


On **July 9**, beginning at 7pm, the Hive Live! presents an evening of poetry with**C.S. Giscombe Gomez** and **NancyMiller** at Bookshop Santa Cruz1520 Pacific Avenue, Santa Cruz.

Giscombe teaches at the University of California's Berkeley campus, where he is the Robert Haas Chair in English. His prose and poetry books include *Negro Mountain, Prairie Style, Ohio Railroads*.

Gomez's first full-length collection, *Inconsolable Objects*, is just out from YesYes Books. She is the author of the chapbook, *Punishment* (Rattle chapbook series).

She co-founded with Ellen Bass an organization that provides writing workshops to incarcerated women and men and has taught poetry in Salinas Valley State Prison, the Santa Cruz County Jails, and Juvenile Hall.




On Wed, **July 10** from 7-8:30 pm the Capitola Library will host **You Will Not Replace Us**, a documentary drama addressing the shared tribulations and historical unity between Black and Jewish Americans. Join Directors and Co-Stars Josh Greene and Luke Harris, along with Cinematographer Jack Lattin and Producer Sydney Kaster for a screening and discussion moderated by UCSC Professor Bruce Thompson.

As the film confronts the complex relationship between Black and Jewish Americans and the common struggle to fight hate, the film is titled *You Will Not Replace Us*, in reference to the popular white supremacist replacement theory rebuked in the film. By bringing together Black and Jewish interviewees, the film sends a clear message: that marginalized communities will not be replaced by bigotry and ignorance.

All are invited to this conversation about the rich history shared by Black and Jewish communities in the United States. Often times, due to replacement theory, these two communities have been pinned against each other and it is our hope that this documentary short serves as a jumping off point for conversations about the histories of and unity between both communities.

Belonging without Othering by john a. powell and Stephen Menendian, is a powerful exploration of creating inclusive communities. Starting on **July 11**, from noon to 1pm, there will be a monthly virtual book club that meets at **obiu.org**.

The pressures that separate us have a common root: our tendency to cast people and groups in irreconcilable terms – or the process of "othering." This book gives vital language to this universal problem, unveiling its machinery at work across time and around the world. To subvert it, john a. powell and Stephen Menendian make a powerful and sweeping case for adopting a paradigm of belonging that does not require the creation of an "other." This new paradigm hinges on transitioning from narrow to expansive identities – even if that means challenging seemingly benevolent forms of community-building based on othering.

john a. powell is an internationally recognized expert in civil rights, structural racialization, housing, and democracy, and the Director of the Othering and Belonging Institute at University of California, Berkeley. He is a former legal director of the American Civil Liberties Union. Stephen Menendian is Assistant Director at the Othering and Belonging Institute, where he manages many ongoing research projects, including the Inclusiveness Index and the California Zoning Atlas.



This is both a live and virtual event.



Beginning on **July 14**, White Awake will host a two part training on radical genealogy.

Radical Genealogy offers people of European descent genealogical research tools for connecting their individual family histories to the broader histories of racism, colonialism, capitalism, traditional culture, and political resistance that shaped our ancestors' lives. Together, as descendants of those who were stripped of their inherited traditions and socialized to become "white," we will explore how to use genealogical study to develop a renewed and rooted sense of self that can power our efforts for collective liberation.

Through two training sessions and curated study materials you will:

- Gain foundational skills for starting your genealogy research and ensuring accuracy.
- Learn about a framework for developing a rooted political identity as a Euro-descendant person through genealogical study.
- Receive insight for connecting your own family's story to three historical windows into our ancestors' collective story: 1. Traditional lifeways, harm endured, and racialization, 2. Harm caused, and 3. Legacies of resistance.
- Be part of a supportive learning community where you can process emotions and discuss questions that arise in your family history research.
