

The workshop will run from 10am-noon followed by a potluck. We encourage you to bring food that does not need refrigeration or heating.




On Tues., **Oct 15**, from 5-7pm, come to a book talk with**Karla Tatiana Vasquez**, author of *The SalviSoul Cookbook* — the first Salvadoran cookbook traditionally published in the U.S.

Vasquez shares her story of being born in El Salvador and raised in Los Angeles after her family fled during the 1980s amid the country's civil war. Through eighty recipes, she explores the rich flavors of Salvadoran cuisine and themes of intergenerational storytelling, cultural preservation of Salvadoran traditions through the culinary arts, and the women and matriarchs that preserve them.

This free event will take place at the Cowell Hay Barn, 1156 High Street, Santa Cruz.




GINGER CHIH has been documenting her worldwide life and travels in words and images for over four decades. At the age of three, her family fled China, settling in Japan, then the UnitedStates.

As a student of Tibetan Buddhist teachings and its meditative practices, she uses her skills as a photographer to document the Tibetan Diaspora and its preservation of cultural and national identity in exile. Over the past ten years, she photographed numerous visits to over two dozen Tibetan refugee communities in India and Nepal.


On **Oct 17**, from 5-6pm, join a virtual SURJ webinar entitled **Beyond White Privilege**. The webinar features a conversation with **Heather McGhee**, NYT best selling author of *The Sum of Us* and leading political thinker on race and the economy, to explore white people's stake in fighting MAGA— and how we can take action to organize white people around their stake in fights for justice.

Reckoning with our privilege is a journey so many of us take in social justice work. And while these learnings are important, individual transformation alone is not enough to substantially shift racist institutions in our country and stop rising authoritarianism, which strategically relies on the support of white people.

We have already seen Trump and Vance using racism to blame immigrants— not corporations or policy— for things like rising housing costs and job loss. This rhetoric is deadly for people of color. And it ensures that none of us- white people included- get the resources our communities desperately need.

We all have a stake in stopping MAGA this year—so that we can build social movements to be powerful enough to deliver the change working people need.

Caste Action Alliance (CAA) is an action group of individuals with a mission of rising up for social and restorative justice. Their main actions are: Educating themselves about systemic racism, distributing the book *Caste* by Isabel Wilkerson to as many people as possible focusing on people in positions of power and influence, memorializing their enslaved ancestors and atoning for their ancestors on the wrong side of history with plaques outside their homes for the public to view, and finally, their most significant effort is to provide scholarship funds for the descendants of enslaved African-Americans ages 18-30 for community college, trade school, university, or graduate school.
